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IRS hikes 2009 commuter benefit tax incentive All four regional transit agencies participate

York, Pa. – Commuter Services of South Central Pennsylvania today alerted employers to an increase in the 2009 federal transportation fringe benefit. The IRS is raising the amount that can be set aside in a worker's qualified, tax-free transportation fringe benefit plan to \$120 per month from \$115.

"This is an excellent way to encourage commuting alternatives and help workers save money," said Brandy Heilman, director of Commuter Services.

Federal law allows employers to provide this benefit for workers who commute via bus, train or registered vanpool. Companies can offer employees:

- 1. a tax-free employer-paid subsidy
- 2. a pre-tax employee-paid payroll deduction, or
- 3. a combination of the two in a shared employee-employer-paid program

Commuter Services help employers set up these plans as part of its free services and partners with transit agencies for transit benefits. All four regional transit agencies (County of Lebanon Transit, rabbittransit, Red Rose Transit Authority and Capital Area Transit) distribute and accept passes that qualify for the benefit.

Employers also may purchase TransitChek® vouchers for use in the program.
